PETITION FOR NATURALIZATION

SUPREME COURT OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK,

FIRST JUDICIAL DISTRICT.

In the matter of the petition of James Vincent Figueroa to be admitted a citizen of the United States of America.

To the Clerk, Supreme Court of the State of New York,

The petitioner James Vincent Figueroa, respectfully shows:

First. My full name is James Vincent Figueroa.

Second. My place of residence is number 263 N. 152nd Street, street, city of NEW YORK.

State, County, or New York District of New York.

Third. My occupation is Laboratory Assistant.

Fourth. I was born on the 24 day of February, anno Domini 1887, at Kingston, British West Indies.

Fifth. I emigrated to the United States from Port Maria, St. Lucia, on or about the 22nd day of April,

anno Domini 1903, and arrived at the port of Gandy Pier, at the United States in the vessel "Carina".

Sixth. I declared my intention to become a citizen of the United States on the 6th day of March, anno Domini 1903,

at New York City, in the Supreme Court of the State of New York.

Seventh. I am married. My wife's name is Alice McElroy, a native of Puerto Rico. She was born in Manchester, N.H. on the 10th day of January, and now resides at 263 N. 152nd Street, street, city of New York, and has two children.

and the name, date and place of birth, and place of residence of each of said children is as follows: Miguel Agosto Theresa, born July 9, 1903, at New York City and resides at 263 N. 152nd Street, New York City.

Eighth. I am not a disbeliever in or opposed to organized government or a member of or affiliated with any organization or body of persons teaching disbelief in organized government. I am not a polygamist nor a believer in the practice of polygamy. I am attached to the principles of the Constitution of the United States, and it is my intention to become a citizen of the United States and to renounce absolutely and forever all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty, and particularly to

EDWARD VII, King of Great Britain and Ireland,

of which at this time I am a subject, and it is my intention to reside permanently in the United States.

Ninth. I am able to speak the English language.

Tenth. I have resided continuously in the United States of America for a term of five years at least immediately preceding the date of this petition, to wit, since the 22nd day of April, anno Domini 1903, and in the State of NEW YORK for one year at least next preceding the date of this petition, to wit, since the 22nd day of April, anno Domini 1903.

Eleventh. I have not heretofore made petition for citizenship to any court. (I make petition for citizenship to the Court of Appeals at Albany, on the 10th day of December, anno Domini 1903, and the said petition was denied by the said Court for the following reasons and causes, to wit,

Attached hereto and made a part of this petition is my declaration of intention to become a citizen of the United States and the certificate from the Department of Commerce required by law. Therefore your petitioner prays that he may be admitted a citizen of the United States of America.
